In order for residents to be healthy and well wherever they may live or work, broadband and healthcare delivery must be connected and allowed to expand throughout rural AND urban areas. Broadband and healthcare delivery must cover the entire healthcare delivery network in a given community.

Considerations for Applying

Category	HCF Program
Off-Site?	Connections associated with off-site data centers and off-site administrative offices used by eligible HCPs for health care purposes are eligible for funding
Rurality	HCP can be located in non-rural location if applying as a member of an eligible consortium



Under the consortium, who can be Healthcare Connect Fund eligible?

- Public or non-profit and one of the following:
 - ✓ Hospital (non-profit)
 - ✓ Post-secondary educational institution offering healthcare instruction (e.g., teaching hospitals or medical schools)
 - ✓ CHCs or centers providing healthcare to migrants
 - ✓ Local health departments or agencies
 - ✓ Community mental health centers
 - ✓ Rural health clinics, includes mobile clinics
 - ✓ Skilled Nursing Facilities
- Certain dedicated EDs of non-profit or FOR-profit hospital

Eligible Expenses	 Telecommunication services Broadband services Network equipment HCP-constructed and owned network facilities (consortia only)





Benefits of the Consortium Approach

- Creation and growth of broadband HCP networks
- Lower administrative costs
- Sharing of medical, administrative, and technical expertise
- Lower prices, higher bandwidth, and better quality connections
- Non-rural sites may participate in consortia and receive the discount, as long as they are in a consortium with a majority rural sites.
- Consortia can include ineligible health care provider sites, who pay their "fair share" but can be part of the network and benefit from negotiated rates
- Improved quality and reduced cost of healthcare through leveraging broadband connections in consortia

Why join the Consortium instead of going it alone?

- ✓ *Individual* applicants (not as a part of a consortium) can receive funding for broadband services and equipment necessary to operate and manage the dedicated broadband healthcare network (e.g., routers, servers)
- ✓ Consortium applicants can receive funding for broadband services, equipment, off-site data centers, administrative offices and upfront costs



Why join the Consortium instead of going it alone?

- Consortium members may apply for funding for non-rural sites. Major changes to the Rurality list for 2016 have impacted many HCP's that were previously rural
- Consortium applications are typically processed substantially quicker than individual HCPs (ex. Apalachee Center: CommHIT hire to funding commitment was much less than the typical 90 days for an individual application [Apr 6 – Jun 21])
- CommunityHealth IT handles all aspects of funding from eligibility application to funding disbursement.



What happens when you join the CommunityHealth IT Consortium?

- ✓ Agreements (HCF-required Letter of Agency and others)
- ✓ Assess eligibility
- ✓ Provide 2017 Consortium Checklist + Timetable (Items/ assistance facility will need to provide through assigned point of contact)
- ✓ Submit request for services and RFPs, if needed
- ✓ Apply for funding
- ✓ Apply for disbursement of funds
